

In November 2014, ADCOSS launched the InnerCity Network (ICN). Another network, another support group. Why was this needed?

In the past, the inner city of Auckland was mainly known as the CBD, the Central Business District, which implies that it is the central part of the city

- and mainly for businesses. However,

the situation is changing. Many people choose to live in the CBD. What are the challenges when you live in the centre of Auckland? Do people in the CBD only share the place where they live, or do they really connect with each other and build networks?

The launch of the *InnerCity Network* in the *Town Hall* was very successful. It was well attended by people who care about how people are living in the InnerCity ... Inner City rather than CBD.

The speakers presented on the importance of community, networks and relationships. One of them, *Prof. Love Chile* gave a presentation on *Connectedness and a Sense of Community*. In a presentation almost three years ago, he considered Community Development as community investment. This approach is very similar to *Dr. James Prescott's* approach on the importance of relationships.

The InnerCity Network has been set up to respond to the needs of the people living in the centre of Auckland. Concerns that were raised at the launch were, among many others:

- ⊗ Loneliness and isolation
- Many international students
- Many small units, and not enough open space
- ⊗ Lack of (primary) schools in walking distance

According to *Auckland Council*, the number of people living and working in the city has changed dramatically within the past 15 years. Whereas in 2001 there were 76,524 employees working in the city and 9,258 residents living in the city, these numbers increased by 2013 to 94,554 employees and 29,301 residents.

We could sum these figures up by saying that 20,000 people have moved to the city to work there. However, this statement doesn't reflect the challenges as much as if we state that the number of employees in the city has increased by 23% whereas the population has increased by 220%!

The *ADCOSS ICN* meetings were held monthly and gave a platform to raise issues and discuss challenges in the Inner City. These challenges started with the organising of the monthly meetings. It was agreed that the meetings would take place at different venues within the city in order to include different organisations and to be present in different parts of the inner city. Trying to organise meetings in venues which are accessible to people with disabilities, has proved to be very difficult. Most possible venues lack affordable parking – and often there is no disability parking close by. How can a group be inclusive, but then exclude potential participants who are in wheelchairs?

Recently, an *Advisory Panel* was set up which identified areas of concern to be discussed within the next six months.
